Update from Dr. Jemma Storrar

The highlight over the last few months has been the appointment of a Bereavement Lead resulting in the relaunch of our bereavement services. I'm delighted to report this includes specialist bereavement counselling, monthly bereavement evenings and monthly coffee mornings. The bereavement section of our website has been updated and there is a wealth of resources for families and individuals. If you know anyone who would benefit from our support, please encourage them to contact the team.

Recruitment has been the focus for the clinical teams over the last few months. We are looking at new ways of attracting clinical staff and we have just held two successful open days for registered health care professionals. One of the new initiatives includes changing the staffing model in the community team with the introduction of health care support workers, this new skill mix will allow us to support more people to remain in their own homes. The community team has also been strengthened by the addition of a community hub co-ordinator and the appointment to our Clinical Nurse Specialist development programme.

In October we had two full time registered nurses starting our newly developed 'Foundations in Palliative Care Programme', this is a year's secondment opportunity for registered nurses from hospitals. We believe opportunities like this help to raise the profile of palliative and end of life care which in turn ultimately improves care for patients in our local community.

We are continually looking at how we can develop our clinical services and to be as effective as possible in this we are inviting our service users to join our newly created hospice user group; we want to hear your voices in how we can best support our local population. Looking Back with David Charsley

Next year, 2022 will mark 30 years since we welcomed our first patients into St. Michael's and we have begun looking back at some of the milestones that happened before that memorable day.

It was in September 1991, that the Duchess of Norfolk laid the foundation stone for the Hospice and that month also marked the moment that the appeal to raise funds for the building of the Hospice broke the £1m barrier.

Heavily involved in those early efforts to raise money was David Charsley who joined the appeal in February 1991 as Executive Officer to coordinate the various events and fundraising activities. David stayed in that role for 3 years before moving on to new fundraising challenges.



It was 30 years ago that the Duchess of Norfolk attended the ceremony to lay the foundation stone. She is pictured here on the left with Alan Turner, Mayor Bob O'Bee and Hilary de Ferranti. David remembers well those early days and told us, "We were working in two offices in the maternity unit at the hospital. The team comprised two volunteer secretaries, an ex-Bank Manager, a collection tin volunteer and other Rotarians that [Hospice Appeal Chairman] Alan Turner had press ganged into giving their time and expertise.

The whole exercise was completed in three years, so from cutting the first turf to the official opening, the pace was frenetic. The community responded to every facet along the way."

David is back now and he has produced a beautiful book, *Travels With my Sketchbook: holidays, work and Christmas* and is kindly donating all the proceeds from its sale to St. Michael's. The book features sketches and watercolours that David has produced over the last 50 years and is available from major bookstores online. Many of the illustrations feature places that will be familiar to Basingstoke residents including snowy scenes of The Golden Lion pub and Alresford High Street. Proceeds from the book have already raised more that £1,600 for the Hospice!

We'd like to thank David for kindly supporting us still.

Surprising things about eBay

When all of the Hospice's stores had to close last year, the resourceful retail team switched as quickly as they were allowed to selling items on eBay. It has proved to be a real success story with items like vintage Star Wars toys which might make £4 in a shop selling for £20 on eBay.

Gavin Page manages the eBay store and Georgia Richardson recently joined to assist. Together they research each item to determine whether they should be auctioned or sold for a fixed price and sometimes they ask for help from other staff members, like Phil Mortimer who knows a lot about silver hallmarks and Debbie Jones who knows a lot about jewellery.

There are still often surprises though. "We had a pair of very well worn riding boots donated which went for £180 and that really surprised me," Gavin told us.

"We are researching ways to be able to use some of the other platforms as well so that we can really help to link customers and collectors with some of the interesting items which come in."

eBay is wonderful for bringing together people from anywhere in the world who might be searching for the obscure. Recently some models of aeroplanes with DHL branding sold for £40 each!

Items usually come to the team from the Donation Centre where staff and volunteers put aside things better suited to eBay, like the discovery of a bracelet with 20 charms on it which went for £1,140 or a vintage Rolex which sold for £1,200, and at other times



people handing over their donations will alert the staff to a potentially valuable item, like a gentleman recently who generously handed over a 9ct gold rope chain which reached £922.

Since the store starting trading during the lockdown last year, it has raised a phenomenal £87,000 from sales!

Farleigh Wallop Woodland Walk

This was our first live event back after 18 months and what a welcome back it was. The event, which was held within the prestigious grounds of the Portsmouth Estate, saw a record-breaking 560 supporters walking out in the stunning Hampshire countryside on a hot summer's day. A big thank you to our walkers who have raised an astounding £21,450, the highest income raised since this event begun in 2007.



Big Wheel Your Way

Despite having to cancel our Big Wheel event, we have seen nearly 100 riders taking to the roads of Hampshire to complete their challenges ranging from 8 to 80 miles. So far, these riders have raised over £6,000, including £1,000 from Oakley Pedalers, which is fantastic.

Moonlight Walk

This year saw over 250 superheroes out in force taking part in the Moonlight Walk. Supporters enjoyed face painting by Routine Riots and a selfie booth from Party Delights, before being greeted to refreshments kindly provided by Lavazza and Basingstoke Deane Rotary Club. To date our walkers, have raised £10,000 for the Hospice, with more sponsorship money expected in over the next few weeks.

Spotlight on Housekeeping team

There are many different people who spend time with our patients and their families when they are on our inpatient unit. From nurses and doctors to therapists and family support, everyone makes sure the time patients spend away from home is as comfortable as possible.

Just as integral to that experience are our team of wonderful housekeepers whose cheerfulness and professionalism, as well as their ability to make excellent cups of tea, brighten everyone's day and keep things running smoothly.

The housekeeping team is managed by Claire Irving and is made up of Sarah Chapman, Maria Sagnella, Lisa Trodd, Kate Wolczyska and joining them as bank housekeepers are Natasha Mafu and Janet O'Toole.

Claire joined St. Michael's in 2017 originally volunteering and then coming on board as a bank housekeeper. Asked what she thought was the key to the success of the relationship between the housekeepers and other staff on the inpatient unit, Claire said she thought it was down to communication. "There are always changes on the ward because of rapidly changing patient needs, rooms might suddenly need to be prepared or a patient may need to move to a larger room, but because there is constant open communication there are never any problems.

"The team was brilliant during COVID. Things changed a lot for us then, not just with the increased importance of disinfecting, but the infection control measures meant staff couldn't mix as much and we couldn't have as many family members in or spend as much time with them. We've all missed the interaction so much. People really want to stop and tell you about their Mums or about their kids."

The role that they play in caring for patients and their families can't be underestimated. When we spoke to Debbie Furness for this magazine in 2018 she told us that she thought patients and families needed someone to chat to but they always felt they didn't want to trouble nurses or doctors whose role they see as caring for their medical needs. However, when a housekeeper brings a cup of tea or pops into a room to do some tidying, they often find they end up having long conversations about the patient's life or how the family are coping.

"We had feedback from the CQC after their recent visit and they marked out the housekeeping team for their passion and the role they played in patient care." Iain Cameron CEO.

The team work in shifts from 7:30 am until 7:30pm. They are a strong, supportive team who often see each other out of work, escape room nights and trips into London included. Liz Hillier and Debbie, two

longstanding team members who retired during Covid last year, still join the team for nights out too.

Clare Turner, who was the Ward Manager on the IPU until she recently left to take up a teaching position at Winchester University, told us she thought every member of the team was just amazing.

"They'll do anything for you, no matter how busy things are and they are always lovely. Just now I saw Lisa stop with a relative in the corridor who was obviously in some distress and she was so kind and took care of her. Kate played a vital role recently too in helping us care for a patient with limited English."

Janet O'Toole, who started work at the Hospice when it opened in 1992 but who took a few years off to work elsewhere when her children were school age, remembers the Hospice when it was mixed wards instead of private rooms, when housekeepers made the breakfast in the morning in the small kitchen on the ward and when smoking in the conservatory was allowed. She told us she still gets up every morning and enjoys coming to work. "What hasn't changed in 30 years is the care for the patients; they have always been everyone's priority."

Clare's Story

My connection to the Hospice started in November 2013 when my Dad stayed there for a few weeks. He had been ill for several months and considered too weak to begin chemotherapy. The plan was to build his strength up and then maybe he could come home and start to have treatment.

I visited him during his stay and was surprised to find the Hospice to be such a happy and welcoming place. The team were amazing and I will never forget the delicious cake in the day room either!

Sadly, Dad passed away at home on 28th November that year but I am certain that his stay in the Hospice gave him more time with us, for which I am forever grateful.

Over the next few years, my family attended the regular Hospice events with the Sunflower Service and Light Up a Life being particular favourites.

In 2014, my brother and sister and I walked a marathon for Cancer Research and one of our training walks was the Moonlight Walk for the Hospice, this was the first Hospice event I'd taken part in. In 2015 with a new love of walking and a desire to raise more funds, I registered for the Thames Path Challenge 50km walk to raise money for the Hospice. It took me 10 hours and 51 minutes to walk from Fulham to Runnymede on that Saturday in September. It was really tough but such a fun day, I'm not sure I'd do it again but I'd recommend it as a challenge if you like walking.

Before we knew it, 2016 rolled around. With a change in circumstances, I found myself at a bit of a loose end a few days a week so I dropped an email over to the Volunteer Team to ask if they needed any help. For the next few months, I volunteered with the events team which was not only a great experience but involved working along with some really lovely people too, many of whom I enjoy catching up with when I see them at events today.

One of my highlights is the Big Wheel event which involved a whole weekend for set up before the event and breakdown afterwards.



My fondest memory of that day is when we were packing up and the very last rider came back after everyone else had finished and gone home. He had his little boy on the back of his bike and had ridden the 64-mile route. Even though he was outside of the time and the marshals couldn't stay with him, he took the decision to carry on and finish. It was quite emotional as he crossed the line and we formed a guard of honour - it really illustrated how much these events mean to those involved.

I moved away later that year but returned in 2017 and got back in touch to volunteer again. I have loved helping out at the Christmas wrapping service in Festival Place in previous years and I'm hoping it will be possible to do so again this year. I was also really honoured to be asked to read a poem for the virtual Sunflower Service this year - it's great that events and fundraising were able to continue even when it wasn't possible for us to gather in person.

In between all of this, I managed to fit in another fundraising activity with an abseil down the Spinnaker Tower in 2018. It was amazing! The weather was perfect and the views incredible - another recommendation from me if you're looking for fundraising ideas! I'm writing this having helped give out walker numbers at the Moonlight Walk last night - the same event that I took part in 7 years ago - it was so lovely to be at a real-life event and again see so many people taking part to raise money for vital Hospice services.

I'd like to say a big thank you to everyone at the Hospice for everything that they do we were so lucky that St. Michael's was there when we needed them and I hope that I can give a little bit back to help make sure they are there for more people who need them in the future.
